Plagiarism Defined

- The wrongful appropriation...and publication as one's own, of the ideas, or the expression of the ideas (literary, artistic, musical, mechanical, etc.) of another."
- "...to take and use as one's own the thoughts, writings or inventions of another."

Plagiarism Defined

- "A student must not <u>adopt or reproduce ideas,</u> <u>words, or statements</u> of another person without appropriate acknowledgment. A student must give credit to the originality of others and acknowledge an indebtedness whenever he or she does any of the following:
 - a. Quotes another person's <u>actual words</u>, either oral or written;
 b. Paraphrases <u>another person's words</u>, either oral or written;
 c. Uses <u>another person's idea</u>, <u>opinion</u>, <u>or theory</u>; or
 d. Borrows <u>facts</u>, <u>statistics</u>, <u>or other illustrative material</u>, unless the information is common knowledge."

Statistics

- 18,000 students were surveyed
 70% admitted to cheating
 - on tests
 - 60% admitted to cheating on other types of assignments.
- "admitted" is the key word
- Cut and paste plagiarism rose from 10% to 41% from 1999-2001*

Why Do Students Plagiarize?

- High stakes!
- Procrastination leads to desperation
- Instructors using the same assignments
- Lack of understanding or poor documentation
- Cultural / Victimless crime read and hear about other students/professionals committing
- Lack of enforcement historically



- Not knowing how to cite sources.
 - Never taught the skills
 - Not understanding when taught
- Sloppy note-taking.
- Different ways of using other people's work
 - Some work situations even demand it

When is it not intentional plagiarism?

- Other countries have other conventions
- Students trying in "good faith," but still incorrect
- Not being able to integrate sources into writing with good style: awkward

Actions that might be seen as plagiarism

Buying, stealing, or borrowing a paper Using the source too closely when paraphrasing

Hiring someone to write your paper Building on someone's ideas without citation
